

State Geography and Demographics Overview







Virginia – **42,775** sq miles (54% in Bay watershed)













Virginia: 40 (Senate) 100 (House)




Maryland Districts

Each Senator represents approximately: **123,000** people Each Delegate represents approximately: **40,947 – 123,000** people






Pennsylvania Districts

50 Senate Districts203 House Districts


Total of: **50** Senators **203** Representatives





Legislative Process Overview



Legislative Process: How a Bill Becomes a Law



Length of Session

Maryland: 90 days

Virginia:60 days (in even numbered years)30 (45) days (in odd numbered years)

Pennsylvania:

2 years

Legislative Process: Bill is Introduced

Maryland: ~3,000 bills are introduced per session (Of the 2,728 bills introduced in 2024, 1053 passed, or **38%**)

Bill is introduced/ sponsored Pennsylvania: ~4,000 bills are introduced per session (Of the 3,862 bills introduced in 2023-24, 217 were enacted, or **6%**)

Virginia: ~3,000 bills are introduced per session (Of the 3,595 bills introduced in 2024, 1046 passed, or **30%**)



Budget Cycle




Length of Cycle

Governor prepares budget


Governor presents budget to General Assembly

*But NOT in Maryland






Things to Note: Maryland

- Legislature is constitutionally required to pass a balanced budget
- Relative power of Governor v. Legislature
- Legislature does not see agency requests prior to budget being prepared
- No veto or amending authority by the governor
- Capital Budget Bond Bill
- Ways the legislature can work around the budget

- Water quality spending is statewide, not Bay Watershed specific
- Two budgets per session
- Capital Budget
- Ways the legislature can work around the budget




- Short Session
- Governor is limited to 4-year term
- AAA Bond rating
- Ways the Legislature can work around the Budget
